My Ministry Experience at Arockia Annai Home for the Aged 09th- 20th Nov 2024, Hosur, Tamil Nadu.

A long-awaited day has arrived for me to experience my first ministry in Tamil Nadu, from November 9th to 20th, 2024. There are seven members in the community: Rev. Fr. Irudaya Raj (the animator), Fr. Thomas, Fr. Joti, Sr. Helen, Sr. Siji, Sr. Nirmala, and Sr. Velankani. Sister Helen, the superior of the community, welcomed us with a warm smile. As I arrived at the ministry site, my heart was exhilarated by the beauty of nature, and the atmosphere allowed me to enjoy the pleasant weather. It was my first time visiting and staying with elderly residents, and I felt a bit jittery at first, often wondering how the work would be and whether I would be happy. However, as the days passed, I was able to connect with the elderly people. Although I initially faced challenges with food and water, I gradually adapted, and my days began to run smoothly. Our schedule was typical, and we participated in English Mass with the residents. On Sundays, the Holy Eucharist was celebrated by Fr. Thomas in Tamil, and we took an active part. After the Holy Eucharist, I rushed to the Marian Garden to see the Indian national bird, the peacock, which I had never seen before.

The tireless efforts of Fr. Irudaya Raj have transformed the Marian Garden into a beautiful space that resembles a Buddhist temple, featuring various Marian statues from different countries. Although it is not yet fully completed, I believe it will be renowned worldwide by next year. I spent time praying the rosary while walking in the garden, followed by breakfast and preparing for work. We were guided by Sister Helen, who assigned our tasks. Much of our work involved cleaning and replanting various types of flowers in the garden. In the evenings, I would spend time with the elderly residents, who respected us greatly, and in return, we showed them love and care. Although there were language barriers, we managed to communicate through actions and gestures. One fine morning, after finishing my work, Sister Helen approached me and asked for my help with Sister Siji. When I arrived, Sister Siji informed me that I needed to clip the nails and clean the wound of an elderly man who had injured his ankle.

The sight was so distressing for me that I felt nauseous and could not stand close to him. I was overwhelmed and could not eat lunch or dinner that day, and at night, I struggled to sleep as the vision kept replaying in my mind. The following evening, while spending time with our Lord Jesus Christ in the Blessed Sacrament, I sensed something troubling inside me. Gradually, I came to realize that our Lord was conveying a message to me. I recalled the Gospel of St. Matthew 25:40: "The King will reply; I tell you, whenever you did this for one of the least important of these brothers of mine, you did it for me." From that day onward, with God's help, I found myself energetically engaging in various tasks alongside the residents.

I felt happy to be with them, sharing my life with the elderly and learning more about their stories. Sister Helen introduced us to some poignant incidents. One was about a young lady who saw her mother collapse and die while working in the field. Fearing she would never marry, her younger sister, who recently married, rejected her. This left the young lady in great distress, leading to her mental breakdown, and the villagers abandoned her at the community's gate. Fr. Irudaya found her and welcomed her as part of the community. Another story was about a software engineer who lost his eyesight due to a project incident. His manager dismissed him, and his family treated him as unwanted, leading to a life of solitude. Eventually, he came to Arockia Annai Sion Spirituality Centre, where he underwent surgery that gradually restored his sight. There was also the tale of a married woman who died during childbirth, leaving her relatives wanting to abandon the newborn. A religious sister intervened, rescued the child, and despite the difficulties, raised both the male and female child. Unfortunately, both children grew up mute, deaf, and dumb. Finally, there was an old woman whose dream was to live with her son and daughter. However, after getting married, they rejected her, forcing her to leave her home. Despite their rejection, her heart longed to return.

Through these stories and experiences, I learned valuable lessons about compassion, resilience, and the importance of community life.

Our food and accommodation exceeded our expectations because Sister Nirmala treated us with such kindness. Whenever we would meet her on the way to work, she would ask, "Brothers, did you eat well? Did you enjoy the food?" Her smile indicated that we were loved by everyone. Sister Siji took great care of us, and whenever we had health issues, she was always there to provide medicine and ensure we regained our health. My ten days of ministry experience made my heart grow fonder. It will remain a cherished memory for me.

Overall, Father Irudaya was very concerned about us, even though he was frequently out of the community. He still dedicated precious time to us and would bring us sweets. My days felt like flowing water in the ocean. Remembering Father Damien and his dedication to helping those rejected by society greatly inspired me. He gave up his own life for them, motivating me to work with people in similar situations in this modern era. I sincerely thank Almighty God for giving me the heart to spend my time in service. I am also very grateful to my director, Father Arockia, for his guidance throughout my ministry days. I would like to thank the community superiors, Father Prem and Father Arul, for their benevolent support and encouragement.


