In God's view, human greatness is measured by how one serves or helps someone who cannot offer anything in exchange, Pope Francis said.

"If we want to follow Jesus, we must follow the path he himself traced out, the path of service. Our fidelity to the Lord depends on our willingness to serve," the pope said before reciting the Angelus prayer Sept. 19 with visitors gathered in St. Peter's Square.

The Gospel of Mark Chapter 9 recounted how the disciples were arguing over which of them was the greatest. Jesus admonished them and insisted, "If anyone wishes to be first, he shall be the last of all and the servant of all." "If you want to be first, you need to stand in line, be last and serve everyone," the pope said.

Jesus' teaching ran counter to what the disciples and most other people then and today think, he said. "The value of a person no longer depends on the role they have, the work they do, the money they have in the bank. No, no, no, it does not depend on this. Greatness and success in God's eyes are measured differently: They are measured by service. Not on what someone has, but on what someone gives."

"Do you want to be first?" the pope asked. "Serve. This is the way."

While serving another has a cost, "as our care and availability toward others grows, we become freer inside, more like Jesus," he said. "The more we serve, the more we are aware of God's presence, especially when we serve those who cannot give anything in return — the poor — embracing their difficulties and needs with tender compassion."

ANNIVERSARY LONDON



The Diocese of Westminster offered the catholic parish of Harrow South and Northolt to the SSCC Region of India on 1st September 2023 appointing Fr Raja Sebastian SS. CC as the parish priest and Fr Alexis Nayak SS.CC. as the assistant priest. The Catholic Parish of St Gabriel's (South Harrow) & St Bernard's (Northolt) has a mixed group of people including Asians (India, Sri Lanka, Philippines, Malaysia, Japan, Taiwan, Pakistan); Europeans (Irish, Poland, Italy, Spain, Albania, Portugal, Romania, Ukraine); Africans (Uganda, Nigeria, Sierra Leone, Kenya) and South Americans (Brazil, Peru, Argentina). Last one year the Sacred Hearts nurture the pastoral needs of this parish. We had successfully run First Holy Communion programme (24 children, travellers' children and 3 special children); Holy confirmation programme (24 children) and infant baptism (27 children. We have 103 volunteers including Parish finance team, catechists, Eucharistic ministers, SVP members, Altar servers, cash counters, Sacristans, Readers, Choir, Stewards, Church cleaners, Youth animators, etc.





We have Sycamore faith group; St Vincente de Paul Conference (SVP); Queen of Peace prayer group; Table Tennis Club to cater the pastoral needs of the people. We visit regularly 20 households to provide the Holy Communion to the elderly. Through this parish the region of India continues the Sacred Hearts charism in the diocese of Westminster, London. 

The hosts expressed their joy and eagerness to pray with us, and we were equally happy to join them. Many people participated in the Rosary, creating a warm, communal atmosphere. Afterward, we shared some biscuits, corn, and tea, and everyone enjoyed the time spent together.





Movie Show to the Villages – We took the initiative to show a movie about Jesus to all the villages. The goal was to bring them together, as many were busy with personal work, and to make them aware of God's presence in their lives.

Rotation in Ludru Mandli Weekly We have organized four groups to handle Parish activities every Sunday, with participants from each village. Additionally, we have divided the weeks into four groups: Ludru Youth, Children, Mothers, and Fathers. Each group will take turns overseeing the activities on a weekly basis

SCHOOL BAG DISTRIBUTION D.S.D.I (Damien Social Development Institute)




In the year 2024, DSDI distributed school bags to the students of the non-formal tuition center. There are 15 tuition centers which DSDI is looking after around the capital city of Bhubaneswar, Cuttack and nearby slum villages. These centers are located in leprosy colonies, slums, and villages. 550 students are studying in the centers. They come from poor families; they can't afford paid tuition for a better education. Therefore, DSDI offers them free tuition, so that they can benefit from our service to outshine in their education. Some families go for daily labour work. Parents are not able to focus on the studies of their children. Some parents insist their children work instead of sending them to school and tuition, only because of the financial burden. Thus, teachers requested DSDI to distribute school bags to the students this year, so that the students could carry books to school. Students were so happy to receive their new school bags. Some students explained how difficult it was to bring their books to school in torn bags which had been with them for a long time. There was fear that the bag would break down and books would get scattered. They were facing more difficulties in the rainy season, their books used to get wet. DSDI is very grateful to Maria Gracia, and Maria Bernad volunteers from Spain, for their kind assistance in getting bags to the students. It was possible because of their kindness towards students. They now have good school bags. DSDI is grateful to Sr. Noemi Carcia sscc, for her kind gesture in accepting our request and initiating to help the institute by reaching out to the people, especially Maria and Gracia, who made this possible for the students. DSDI is very grateful to all who made this possible for the poor children of our non-formal tuition centers.


I also had the opportunity to meet Fr. Martin Hayes, the Vicar General of the Westminster Diocese, who had previously welcomed the region of India to the diocese.
