Let us keep Hope in the Lord. He will renew.

EUCHARISTIC CELEBRATION FOR THE PARISH YOUTH LEADERS



1st March Birth of Good Father Mary Joseph Coudrin





LOCAL SUPERIORS MEETING



On Saturday March 4, the anniversary of the priestly ordination of the Good Father, a meeting of the local superiors of the Region took place. The meeting was online and the participants were: Umakant Porichha (Dum Dum), Arul Esthakiyan (Serampore), Felipe Lazcano (Dangadighila), Subal Nayak (Ludru, who joined the meeting at 10 am), Alexis Nayak (DSDI), Ajith Kumar (BBSR), Balakrishna Singh (Bangalore), and Radhelal Jatwar (as a member of the Regional Government).

The meeting began at 9:15 am, a quarter of an hour late, with a short prayer animated by Umakant, coordinator of the Ongoing Formation Commission. Likewise, Uma addressed a few introductory words recalling the importance of constant renewal in our religious life, alluding to the document Perfectae Caritatis (Vatican II), the process of synodality that we are experiencing today in the Church, as well as the Vision Statement and proposals for 2022-25 of the last Regional Assembly. Alexis asked the question about what the objectives were for this meeting and the answer was that this meeting of local superiors aims to have a space to share among the superiors how this service is being carried out, learning from each other, reinforcing communion and also having a moment for the formation of the superiors in their task.

The sharing

Thus, the participants began to share how they feel in this service of authority. The most repeated feeling was that they are happy, although concerns were also expressed about the attitudes of some brothers, about the difficulties that arise in the pastoral service, because of fatigue, or because of having to spend much time outside the community.

For superiors it is a blessing when:

- The brothers are responsible, they carry out the various tasks helping each other, looking for how to do it better, with new initiatives.

- There is mutual appreciation between brothers.

- In brothers there is maturity to accept limitations without grumbling and just doing what needs to be done.

- When energy is transmitted from one to another.

- The community also takes care of the superior.

On the other hand, the challenges that were pointed out were:

- The fatigue (physical and psychological) of being attentive to everyone in the community.

- Difficulties in communication, the lack of dialogue, of explanations, when the brothers do not share their interiority.

- There is no sufficient information of what is to be done or being done.

- The lack of understanding of reality and the negative impact that the difficulties that come from pastoral care have, because the plans cannot be carried out as desired.

- The lack of interest in some brothers, some kind of indifference, lack of willingness to be more committed to the community an its PARL.

After a short break, the topic of how communion and mission are being encouraged in the local communities was taken up. These are some of the practices that were discussed:

- The importance of the elaboration of the PARL of the community, as a moment of communion and deepening in our mission, having the PARL as a support for community life.

- Doing first yourself, the superior, what you have to ask the brothers; "When I do it first, I can ask the brothers to do it too."

- Community meetings, which are weekly in one community, every two weeks in other communities and monthly in others. It was recalled that in the last Canonical Visit of the General Government it was recommended that they go at least every two weeks.

- In addition to these "official" community meeting moments, other informal moments are used to share information, comment, etc... Information that goes both ways, reciprocal, from the superior to the community and from the community to the superior.

- The documents that are received from the General Government, or from the Province or from the Regional Government are used to have a common reflection and sharing.

- Having an agenda for community meetings, which the brothers receive in advance, is a good help.

- The moments of "faith sharing" are also a good element for the animation of the community, as well as ensuring community moments of prayer.

- Everything said so far is also valid for the animation of the community mission. It was recalled that the main agent of the mission is the local community and that the witness of communion and fraternity is an essential part of this mission.

- The superiors also commented on the availability that should characterize our communities, inserted in a local Church, for all kinds of help that are asked of us. Likewise, to encourage this availability towards our sscc sisters.

T<u>he talk about the role of the Local Superior</u>

With these reflections the morning ended, reconnecting at 3 pm to have a talk with our brother Camille Sapu sscc, Provincial Superior of Africa, on "The role of the local Superior". Camille offered his own experience as a superior and, with very realistic observations, he reflected on the role of the local community, the qualities of the local superior, synodality in the community and some concluding reflections.

Camille's presentation was highly valued, for his way of presenting the ideas and for being very much down-to-earth, at the same time that he transmitted sscc values and style.

Finally, an evaluation of the meeting was made, which in general terms is considered positive and is appreciated and suggestions for future meetings were given.

The blood donation camp was graced by Dr. Sachidananda Mohanty, the Director of Medical Education and Training -Government of Odisha, and Dr. Kalyan Kumar Sarkar, the Director of Bhubaneswar Municipal Coroporation (BMC) Hospital Blood Bank, Bhubaneswar.

The purpose of organizing the blood donation camp was to preserve the blood in the blood bank in order to save the lives of the poor and vulnerable patients who do not have access to receive blood when they are in need. The bags of

blood collected have been kept in the custody of BMC Hospital Blood Bank in Bhubaneswar with condition that the priority is to be given to the poor when they need blood. The patients in need of blood can contact the chair-person of the IHRPC, Odisha, who will ensure that the needed blood for the patient(s) is made available. The name of the organization, the name of the chair-person and the contact number of the chair-person has been registered in the BMC Hospital Blood Bank. We thank our donors who generously came forward to donate their blood to save lives.





Free Eye Check-up Camp at Damien Clinic (Choudwar)

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A free eye check-up camp was held at Damien Clinic in Coudrin Chhatrabas campus in Choudwar on February 28, 2023. The eye check-up camp had been organized in networking with Modern Eye Care Super Speciality Hospital, Cuttack. A team of a doctor, a nurse and two medical assistants from the hospital carried out the free eye check-up camp. There were 28 patients from the Trinath leprosy colony and from the local area benefited from the free eye treatment provided by the medical team of the hospital.





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
