We wanted to do this to directly reach out to the needed patients affected by Covid - 19.

Therefore, I invite the communities to come up with some plans and projects to help covid patients and/or their families or to people whose lives have been affected by the impact of the Covid – 19 pandemic.

HUMANITARIAN RESPONSE TO THE SECOND WAVE OF COVID - 19

The first wave of Covid – 19 pandemic in 2020 brought about an immense economic distress in the lives of migrant workers, daily wage labourers and of the poor both in the urban cities and in the rural villages. The effect of lockdown after lockdown across the nation affected the lives and livelihood of these marginalized sectors of our society. Who can ever forget the images of exodus of migrant workers trekking hundreds and thousands of kilometres of highways and byways of the nation

returning to their homes in rural villages! Who can ever forget the images of buses, trains and planes bringing these migrants back to their homes in rural villages! There is no doubt that thousands died of the pandemic during the first wave of Covid – 19, but the worst affected were the migrant workers, the daily wage labourers and the poor of our nation. In response to the humanitarian needs caused by the impact of the first wave of Covid –



19, the Congregation of the Sacred Hearts of Jesus and Mary carried out relief works and reached out to about 800 families with food ration, protective masks, sanitizers and financial assistance.

Once again, the second wave of Covid – 19 pandemic in 2021 has been ravaging the nation enormously. Not only millions of people are getting infected and getting treated, but also millions of patients are dying across India. According to the recent New York Times analysis of number of deaths caused by the second wave of the pandemic in India, it is estimated that 42 lakhs (4.2 millions) patients have died as of now. Such is the impact of the second wave of Covid – 19 on human lives. Again, the impact of the pandemic is not only on human lives (deaths), but also on the daily lives and livelihood of those in the margins of our society who have been left with no job and no income, and thus poverty and hunger. The lockdowns, which are necessary to contain the virus, have once again made their lives worse and economically very difficult to cope up with and to survive. To such economic distress and humanitarian



needs of people caused by the impact of the second wave of Covid – 19, the Congregation of the Sacred Hearts of Jesus and Mary in India through its social wing "Damien Social Development Institute (DSDI)" is coordinating to carry out humanitarian relief works of food ration, protective masks and sanitizers, medical assistance, and other rehabilitation programs in places wherever we are serving. The Congregation is already going to feed 200 Covid patients in a Covid Care Centre in Kolkata in June. We thank the generous hearts and hands that contribute to this humanitarian service of the Congregation in India.

COVID-19 RELIEF WORK IN ST. DAMIEN OF MOLOKAI CHURCH

Every morning, in the Casa Santa Marta, Pope Francis dedicates his Mass to particular groups of people who are suffering the effects of the coronavirus pandemic. On 28th March, the Pope prayed for those



suffering from hunger because of the coronavirus pandemic.

"We're beginning to see people who

are hungry because they can't work. They may not have had a regular job, and from many other circumstances. We're beginning to see the aftermath that will come later. But it's beginning now. We pray for the families who are beginning to find themselves in need because of the pandemic". he parishioners of St. Damien of Molokai Church, Dum Dum are not exceptional for the coronavirus pandemic. The lock down in West Bengal is extended to May 15 and there is no guaranty that it will end after that. Many of our parishioners are working in private companies. Some are paid half salary and

some can't travel for their work places due to the restrictions in the transportation. And many of them are affected by this deadly virus, by the grace of God they all are safe and recovering from it. Due to this outbreak many were forced to suffer from joblessness, poverty and foodlessness in the families. Many of them asked for help from the church but the church had no income in the last two months. Fr. Umakant brought the suffering situation of many to the parish notice. God was so gracious that some of our parishioners with their generous heart came forward to donate little dry rations for the people who are in need. Then St. Damien parish collected all the dry rations like Rice, Dal, Oil, Potato, Soya and Sault together and distributed to the people those who are in most



need. We could not reach out to all the people but gave the importance to those who are really poor and suffering. And we are still getting many more requests from our parishioners, even from our neighbours who are near our residence. We also thank and pray for all the donors who came forward to help the needy.

Amid the suffering of the pandemic, Pope Francis said, "we meet the faces of so many brothers and sisters in difficulty. Let us not pass by, let us allow our hearts to be moved with compassion, and let us draw near," He had dedicated much of his papacy to drawing attention to those living on society's margins, including the homeless, the poor and migrants.

Final Profession Celebration


"You did not choose me, but I chose you and appointed you so that you might go and bear fruit" (Jn 15:16)
